S&P 500 Rebounds After Back-to-Back Losses

Week-ending Jitters Trim Gains

All three major U.S. equity averages posted sub-1% gains last week, as post-holiday jitters trimmed strong tech and retailer-based gains ahead of Wall Street's Christmas break. Investors were also relieved that President Biden signed into law new funding legislation that averted a partial government shutdown. Valuation concerns, rising Treasury yields, and a pullback in consumer confidence were negative catalysts on Thursday and Friday. Trading volumes were notably thinner for the holiday-shortened week.

For the Week...

The S&P 500 gained 0.70%, after posting its best Christmas Eve performance (+1.1%) since 1974 on Tuesday. The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 0.35%, breaking a three-week losing streak while the tech-heavy Nasdaq Composite climbed 0.78%. Overseas markets outperformed, with the MSCI EAFE Index advancing 1.79% and the MSCI Emerging Markets Index rose 1.04%.

New Home Sales Rebound

Sales of newly constructed homes rose by 5.9% to an annualized rate of 664,000 in November, up from a near one-year low of 627,000 in October. Overall demand remains depressed due to high mortgage rates, high home prices and tight supply of available new homes for sale.

Weekly Sector Insights

Nine of the 11 major sector groups posted gains last week led by Energy (+1.21%), Healthcare (+1.12%), and Communication Services (+0.92%). Industrials (+0.02%) rose the least while Materials (-0.27%) and Consumer Staples (-0.18%) declined. In year-to-date (YTD) performance, Communication Services (+42.68%), Technology (+39.57%), and Consumer Discretionary (+33.56%) remain this year's top performers.

Treasury Yields Advance Again

The yield on 10-year Treasury notes climbed 0.10% last week to 4.624%. The U.S. Dollar Index rose 0.4%, now up in 12 of the past 13 weeks. Gold backpedaled 0.5% to end the week at \$2,631.90/ounce while U.S. WTI crude oil futures rebounded 1.6% to end Friday at \$70.60/barrel.



Chart of the Week: Consumers Less Confident



Consumer confidence unexpectedly declined in December, despite robust consumer spending in recent months. While there was a narrow decline in sentiment about the present situation, consumers were much less rosy on future expectations. Higher mortgage rates dented home purchase plans.

Glossary

The **Dow Jones Industrial Average** is a price-weighted average of 30 significant stocks traded on the New York Stock Exchange and the NASDAQ.

The **S&P 500** is an index of 500 stocks chosen for market size, liquidity and industry grouping (among other factors) designed to be a leading indicator of U.S. equities and is meant to reflect the risk/return characteristics of the large cap universe.

The NASDAQ Composite Index includes all domestic and international based common type stocks listed on The NASDAQ Stock Market. The NASDAQ Composite Index is a broad based index.

The **Russell 2000 Index** measures the performance of the small-cap segment of the U.S. equity universe and is a subset of the Russell 3000 Index representing approximately 10% of the total market capitalization of that index. It includes approximately 2000 of the smallest securities based on a combination of their market cap and current index membership.

The **Russell 3000 Index** measures the performance of the largest 3,000 U.S. companies representing approximately 98% of the investable U.S. equity market.

The **Russell Midcap Index** measures the performance of the mid-cap segment of the U.S. equity universe and is a subset of the Russell 1000 Index. It includes approximately 800 of the smallest securities based on a combination of their market cap and current index membership.

The **Bloomberg US** Aggregate Bond Index, which was originally called the Lehman Aggregate Bond Index, is a broad based flagship benchmark that measures the investment grade, US dollar-denominated, fixed-rate taxable bond market. The index includes Treasuries, government—related and corporate debt securities, MBS (agency fixed-rate and hybrid ARM pass-throughs), ABS and CMBS (agency and non-agency) debt securities that are rated at least Baa3 by Moody's and BBB- by S&P. Taxable municipals, including Build America bonds and a small amount of foreign bonds traded in U.S. markets are also included. Eligible bonds must have at least one year until final maturity, but in practice the index holdings have a fluctuating average life of around 8.25 years.

The **Bloomberg US Corporate High Yield Index** measures the USD-denominated, non-investment grade, fixed-rate, taxable corporate bond market. Securities are classified as high yield if the middle rating of Moody's, Fitch, and S&P is Ba1/BB+/BB+ or below, excluding emerging market debt. Payment-in-kind and bonds with predetermined step-up coupon provisions are also included. Eligible securities must have at least one year until final maturity, but in practice the index holdings has a fluctuating average life of around 6.3 years.

The **Bloomberg US Municipal Bond Index** covers the USD-denominated long-term tax exempt bond market. The index has four main sectors: state and local general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, insured bonds, and prerefunded bonds. Eligible securities must be rated investment grade (Baa3/BBB- or higher) by Moody's and S&P and have at least one year until final maturity.

The **MSCI EAFE** Index is designed to measure the equity market performance of developed markets (Europe, Australasia, Far East) excluding the U.S. and Canada. The Index is market-capitalization weighted.

The MSCI Emerging Markets Index is designed to measure equity market performance in global emerging markets. It is a float-adjusted market capitalization index.

The **Bloomberg Commodity Index** is a broadly diversified index that measures 22 exchange-traded futures on physical commodities in five groups (energy, agriculture, industrial metals, precious metals, and livestock), which are weighted to account for economic significance and market liquidity. No single commodity can comprise less than 2% or more than 15% of the index; and no group can represent more than 33% of the index.

The **S&P GSCI Crude Oil Index** is a sub-index of the S&P GSCI, provides investors with a reliable and publicly available benchmark for investment performance in the crude oil market.

The **S&P GSCI Gold Index**, a sub-index of the S&P GSCI, provides investors with a reliable and publicly available benchmark tracking the COMEX gold futures market.

The **U.S. Dollar Index** is a weighted geometric mean that provides a value measure of the United States dollar relative to a basket of major foreign currencies. The index, often carrying a USDX or DXY moniker, started in March 1973, beginning with a value of the U.S. Dollar Index at 100.000.
